I want to thank the Medical Dermatology Society for the extremely generous grant to allow me to spend time with Dr. Sethi at the University of Chicago for a month. Dr. Sethi and the entire division of dermatology at the University of Chicago were very gracious hosts and incredibly welcoming.

After she patiently answered all those questions, she would take every part of our down-time in clinic to go over a couple of questions of a list that I had prepared (see other attachment) to help me figure out the best way to go about bringing dermatology to an underserved region. Having a purely dermatology elective to the Global Health Department at USC was also a goal of mine and Dr. Sethi gave me her approval to work with USC's Office of Student Affairs to allow USC medical students who have an interest in dermatology to go with her to Malawi. I was also extended an invitation and plan on going the year or two after residency so I can see first-hand how that clinic operates.

During my visit at the University of Chicago, I was also able to attend the residents' dermatopathology teaching sessions and all their lecture series for resident education. When Dr. Sethi wasn't in clinic she graciously had talked with other attendings to ensure if it was okay for me to spend time with other residents in their clinics and so I got to spend time with Dr. Sotani and Dr. Iyengar during their Mohs cases and also with Dr. Shea in his general dermatology clinic.

Again, I want to thank everyone at the Medical Dermatology Society for giving me this amazing opportunity to spend time with Dr. Sethi and the rest of the dermatologists at University of Chicago.
