The ability to evaluate and treat connective tissue diseases like dermatomyositis, scleroderma, lupus and even psoriatic arthritis from multiple different specialty perspectives was also helpful in integrating care for patients. In addition, when working in Dr. Saavedra's clinic, we saw multiple cases of severe pemphigus requiring systemic therapy, like chemotherapy and IVIg.
